Uniform Check - 8th January onwards - Reminder

A reminder to all parent that we have made the decision to return to our 'no extensions' policy from **8 January 2024** to ensure there are no grey areas in uniform policy.

All students will be checked on arrival at school on 8th January and those in incorrect uniform that cannot be easily rectified will be taken out of lessons until uniform is correct.

If you require financial support with any aspect of uniform purchase, please do get in touch with your child's SSO in the first instance.

The key elements of our Uniform Policy are as follows:

- Black backpacks/rucksacks (for Year 7)
- Shoes to be leather or leather-look; black, flat, plain and sensible
- No trainers (black plimsolls will be provided where required)
- Coats to be plain black or navy
- No phones or headphones
- Skirts to be unrolled and untailored

- Make up to be discreet
- One small pair of stud earrings
- One religious symbol may be worn discreetly under blouse
- Nails no polish, no extensions
- Lashes no lash extensions
- Hair to be colours that can be found in natural hair

Items not conforming to criteria above will be confiscated and taken to school office.

Sociology & Psychology News

Lower school: Recently Miss Smith helped to run a session on Forensic Psychology and Offender Profiling with year 10 for Challenge Day. Students learnt what Offender Profiling is, how it was developed, and some of the problems with it. It is hoped that this will have sparked an interest in the Social Sciences with the lower years, and help them to start thinking about what they might like to do after their GCSE's, or future careers.

Year 13 students have been busy working hard on their Pre-Public Exams. This is a reminder to students about the amount of work they need to do in preparation for success and the importance of a growth mind-set! Students have been using their PLC's (Personal Learning Checklist), and practice exam papers to support their revision. It has been lovely to see how hard some of the students are working and how much they care about their studies. Although we know students have found it stressful, this is really important practice for their final exams and will all be worth it in the end. Plus, it has been lovely reading some of their papers and seeing them develop as A' level students. For those who were disappointed with their marks, we hope they will use their Growth Mindset to review their current practice/level of work and learn from their mistakes.

Year 12 Sociology students have been learning about Class and Education with Miss Smith and how we can create more equality within the education system. What can governments do to reduce the gap between middle class and poorer students, and how effective these policies are in making education fairer? With Miss Purbrick they have been looking at different research methods and trying to apply these to studying the education system and Sociology in general.

Year 12 Psychology students have been learning about research methods with Miss Smith, a topic I'm sure they are keen to finish, as it has been quite a slog! However, this will pay off when they start to apply their knowledge of research methods to actual psychological research. With Miss Purbrick students have been doing Attachment, how/why do young children make attachments and what are the consequences of these for future relationships? With Miss Reid students have been looking at social psychology including research into obedience. This has practical application to events such as the Second World War, and compliance within the COVID pandemic. Students have also been looking at whether people would behave the same nowadays, if this research were to be repeated?

We wish all our lovely students a happy and restful Christmas, have fun, but remember to do some independent study too! Remember to use our department library and TEAMS pages for additional reading/research.

Blackfen Chess Club

There was some really close matches but Iris held her nerve and won all five of her matches to become the new Blackfen Chess Champion.

COMPUTING AND ICT DEPARTMENT NEWS

In November, our Y7 students and eighteen Y8 students were involved in two national computing competitions.



210 Y7 Blackfen students took part in the UK BEBRAS national online competition during one of their computing lessons.

The competition introduces students to computational thinking, a problem-solving method used in computer programming. Students are presented with challenges they need to solve, in increasing levels of difficulty, competing against students in their own age group.

This year 117,467 students aged 10-12 took part in the competition across the UK. All our students did very well and completed all the challenges and one of our students, Sophie R, from G2, received a gold certificate for being within the top 10% of results nationally. There were also 58 Distinction and 51 Merit awards.



Also in November, 18 of our Y8 students from 8A, 8B, 8E and 8F took part in a 10 days' long online computing national competition run by the National Cyber Security Centre which aims to inspire girls interested in technology to consider careers in the cybersecurity field. In England the participants must be in Year 8.

The students competed in teams of up to four, in their own time in the evening and during one weekend. A computing room was also made available to those who wished to meet together during school lunchtimes.

Our volunteers demonstrated resilience and independence in learning and should be very proud of their accomplishments, both as individuals and as team members. In order to solve as many

challenges as possible within the 10 days of the competition, they had to teach themselves cryptography, logic, artificial intelligence, networking and cybersecurity, using online resources. The challenges were set by National Cyber Security Centre specialists and ranged from beginners to advanced.

Blackfen registered 7 teams in total. Three of our teams were very close in achievement. However, the top Blackfen team achieved 1890 points. It was made up of Swaraa A (G3), Ellie B (P7) and Winnie L (B8) who completed 50 challenges from all the categories, at both beginners and intermediate level. Two of our students, Malia M (B6) and Alice K (B9) achieved 1165 and 1015 points respectively and Alice solved 20 challenges in all categories, from beginners to advanced level. Sia D (G8) ended up being the only member of her team to participate and solved 20 challenges by herself.

All participants received their own certificate from the National Cyber Security Centre. Well done to them! They did us all proud!

Year 9 Careers Interviews

As part of the Year 9 KS4 options process all Year 9 students will be invited to attend a small group interview with Liz Wynn-Owen our Careers Advisor from CER Services.

These informal interviews will take place throughout January – March. It will be very beneficial for your child to attend their interview as it will give them the opportunity to discuss their future career options thus enabling them to make the right choices.

Your child was issued with the 'Year 9 preparation for Key Stage Course Selection booklet' during a community session in December. The booklet will help them to reflect and think through the selection process, with sections of the booklet to be completed together with your child. The booklet should be completed at home and community time and your child should bring it to their small group careers interview and their final Key Stage 4 course selection meeting with Blackfen School's Leadership Team on Wednesday 13th March.

The Key Stage 4 course selection is a guided process of which family support is essential and to ensure that your child has the best possible choice of training, study and employment at the end of Year 11 we ask you to take time with your child to complete pages 2-10 and page 21 of the booklet. Once you have completed these pages please sign to confirm on page 1 of the booklet.

'The Nightmare before Christmas' (1993)


What might, could or even should happen when the elfin world of Christmas is hijacked by the goblin world of Halloween?
