Dear Parents/Carers,

I hope that you had a good week at half term. We are now 2 weeks into the new half term and examinations continue for students in years 11, 12 and 13. Our year 10 students start their PPEs on Friday. This half term is going to be extremely busy as we welcome our new year 7 and year 12 students, make visits to primary schools across Bexley and beyond, hold our sports day and celebrate the successes of our young people in the celebration events near the end of term. ## **Literacy Across the Curriculum**

We would like to express our thanks to the many parents who provided feedback to our recent reading survey. We are, unfortunately, unable to respond to individual queries since the survey was anonymous, however I would like to address the most common queries.

Firstly, you asked for library lessons to take place. We are pleased to assure you that all Year 7 and 8 classes have one discrete hour's library lesson every other week where they may read, receive assistance with choosing books and sit reading tests and book quizzes using our Accelerated Reader Package. We also note that many parents were requesting recommended reading lists; these have always been available however, we have now updated our school website to make the library page and resources more easily accessible. Students can also obtain these lists as papers copies from the school library. Furthermore, parents also asked whether reading could place during form time. We already have a school policy whereby one CT session per week is dedicated to Drop Everything and Read and carrying a reading book is considered to be an essential item of school equipment.

Finally, many parents requested that wider reading be set by teachers as homework. I will be sharing that request with all staff. Please may I also make you aware that Year 7 and 8 already have reading logs where they are supposed to be recording independent reading they undertake at home - it has been an existing requirement that this should be 20 minutes every day. May I also remind you of the Wider Reading Across the Curriculum Booklet, which is available at parents' evenings and on the school website and has a list of texts to broaden student knowledge across all curriculum areas. Enrichment opportunities such as year 7,8 and 9 Book Club run throughout the school year.

I hope this has addressed your queries however please contact either myself or your child's English teacher should you have any remaining questions.
