Dear Blackfen students

A good morning to you all.

Yesterday was the 200th "birthday" celebration for Florence Nightingale. I wonder what she would have thought about the current situation? If you are not aware of the contribution that Florence Nightingale made to modern day nursing, alongside others, aim to do some research to find out more. Her birthdate is remembered each year through International Nurses Day. During our lifetime so far we would have had many encounters with nurses, probably starting on the day we were born! I know some of you, due to ongoing health concerns or an underlying condition, will know some nurses very well. Many young people leave Blackfen to go into nursing and midwifery as careers, and many parents/carers are nurses. Ms Morris, one of our staff, is also a nurse and she has been doing many additional shifts over the last few months. As a society we are full of admiration and appreciation of the work of the nursing profession. We thank them for their work, care and dedication.

Over the last few months I have written to you about this journey we are on. It is clear that we are starting to move slowly to a so called new normal. Keep moving forwards and keep your head up. For, if you keep your head up, you can see far more than the ground at your feet.
